Proposed Essay Topics

1) American Foreign Policy and the Future of Multilateralism

Over the postwar decades, the United States played a leadership role in building multilateral regimes and institutions across a wide range of policy areas. It was a founder of the United Nations and champion of the Bretton Woods system, and during and after the Cold War, Washington played an important role in fostering multilateral agreements in trade, public health, environment, foreign aid, and humanitarian assistance. To be sure, Washington was often an ambivalent multilateralist, seeking at various junctures to protect its sovereignty and policy autonomy and exercise power unilaterally. Today, multilateral cooperation is at a low ebb. What is the future of multilateralism, and what are America's choices? Does supporting and operating within multilateral frameworks for cooperation still serve America's interests, and what might the agenda be for rebuilding the global system of multilateralism?

2) American Options in the Middle East

The Trump administration's war with Iran marks another major upheaval in the United States' fraught strategic relations with the region. Looking beyond the day-to-day military dangers and diplomatic maneuvers, what are America's major grand policy options for the region? What are America's choices? Is there a sustainable path forward that allows the United States to remain a security ally to Israel and its Arab allies in the region, while dealing with Iran's nuclear threat and proxy provocations across the region? Is there a path that allows the United States to deescalate its role in the region and rebalance its military commitments,

doing so in the face of a rising China and other pressing regional demands? What are America's interests in the Middle East and how are they best advanced and defended?

3) The Future of Germany in Europe and the Atlantic World

Germany has tied its foreign policy to Europe and the Atlantic alliance, fashioning what some have called a civilian great power role. The Russian war on Ukraine, the return of the Trump administration, and the rise of right-wing movements on the continent have shifted the ground upon which German politics and foreign policy operates. This essay explores the changing debates inside of Germany about its leadership role in Europe, relations with the United States and NATO, and its standing and identity as a great power. What is the future of US-Germany relations, and what choices do Washington and Berlin face in giving shape to those relations?

In what policy areas might Washington and Beijing find opportunities to cooperate? What are the choices that the United States faces in forging a steady and sustainable grand strategy toward China? What principles of international order -- starting with Westphalian norms of sovereignty and power management -- might provide the basis for Washington and Beijing to negotiate the terms for a wider consensus among states in East Asia and the wider world about international order?

What are the choices that Brazil faces in this shifting geopolitical environment -- both in its global relations with China, Europe, and the rest of the world, and within the Western Hemisphere? Can Brazil and the United States forge a stable and mutually beneficial relationship in the

years ahead, and if so, what would be its terms? What sorts of relationships between Brazil/Global South and the United States might be built in the aftermath of Trump 2.0?

Western Hemisphere increase their cooperation in addressing these complex problems? What are America's foreign policy choices? This essay will explore how U.S. drug policy intersects with diplomacy and border security in Latin America and what strategies might reduce cartel power without undermining the fragile governments we partner with.
